Cuban-born Artist Tatiana Garmendia Tells It Like It Is In Solo Show at Gage Academy's Steele Gallery

(Seattle, WA – August 29, 2017) The Gage Academy of Art will feature a multi-media exhibition highlighting the work of Cuban-born artist Tatiana Garmendia at their Steele Gallery, on view from September 13 through October 4, 2017. *everything passes everything stays* showcases paintings, drawings, photos, sculptures, and video exploring themes of political asylum, migration, memory and cultural mythologies. The opening reception will be held September 15th from 6-9pm.

"I'm not holding anything back," says the artist, pointing to an empty chair, covered by an embroidered

military blanket. "I stitched all these torture techniques the Castro government used on my father, who

died at just 36. Tragically, they're also the techniques the USA government uses on detainees at

Guantanamo." Other works in the show are less confrontational. There are several self-portraits, oil

paintings and ink drawings on translucent polyester film. On one wall, a series of experimental videos

project Garmendia's meditation on immigration, and the personal consequences of losing and finding a

home. All the works on view explore a theme of sacrifice, political punishment and suspension by

weaving together personal narrative with larger historical events.

Born in Havana at the height of the cold war, the artist remembers the two years she and her family were

confined to a camp for political dissidents. "A couple of years ago my brother found the tickets that

brought us to the USA...they were paid by the International Rescue Committee." That was in 1969. The

IRC is still rescuing political refugees. Garmendia talks about being a refugee in a concurrent show, No

Hiding Place Down Here at the Seattle Presents Gallery through October 14, 2017. The piece, a

commission by the Seattle Office of Arts & Culture, addresses Seattle's complicated relationship with the

homeless. The artist culled from her own loss of home and country to find an empathic link to the stories

of the unsheltered projected onto the installation.
